We also learned that a border is a place where one area ends and another begins. Borders that are straight are man-made (like a fence around your back yard) and borders that wander are natural features (like a river or lake). Use your pack of crayons and follow the directions at the bottom of the page.



Use an orange crayon to show the border between Michigan and Wisconsin.

Use a purple crayon to show Michigan's southern border with Indiana and Ohio.

Use a brown crayon to show the three places where Michigan borders Canada by a river.

Use a red crayon to number the three Great Lakes that border the Upper Peninsula.

Use a green crayon to number the three Great Lakes that border the Lower Peninsula.

Use a blue crayon to draw an arrow pointing out the man-made border between Michigan and Wisconsin.

Use a green arrow to point out the natural border between Michigan and Wisconsin.

Use a black crayon to draw a dot in the only spot in Michigan where you can go south to get to Canada.
